

In 2025 and beyond, we will continue to adapt to the needs of our changing community. With your help, we can remain a place people think of when they need help—and a place where hope always lives



HOMELESSNESS

Our housing programs provide critical support to individuals and families experiencing homelessness, from emergency shelter to permanent supportive housing and rapid re-housing services. As the only homeless shelter in Wyoming that welcomes pets, we remove one of the many barriers to stability. With the continued rise in housing insecurity due to the lack of affordable options, our services are more vital than ever.

Last year, we provided 11091 nights of shelter to 445 people.

3000 more people stayed at the shelter last year compared to the year before,

including 35% more children. Over 650 people and families received

other housing assistance, including permanent supportive housing for individuals and families, Section 8, homeless prevention, rapid re-housing, and street outreach.



HOMELESSNESS

Did you know that someone living on the streets costs taxpayers an average of \$35,000 per year in emergency services? In contrast, we're able to provide a night of shelter—plus food, case management, and support—for just \$25 per person. Last year, 445 people stayed in our shelter. If each of those individuals had remained unsheltered, it would have cost our community over \$15 million. Our total operating budget, which covers not only housing but hunger relief and community assistance, was just over \$3 million. Not only do the people we serve receive more comprehensive care and dignity, but it also makes economic sense. Your support truly multiplies in impact.

From Homelessness to Hope: Wanda's Journey



Wanda Koffler, Way Station Program Supervisor, is living proof of resilience and the power of support. Once facing homelessness herself, Wanda now leads efforts to support those experiencing housing insecurity - drawing on her own journey to connect, empathize, and uplift.

In the summer of 2024, Wanda was awarded a prestigious scholarship to attend the National Alliance to End Homelessness (NAEH) Conference and Capitol Hill Day in Washington, D.C. She joined a national network of peers with lived experience (PLEE), sharing Insights and advocating for meaningful change.

Wanda's connection to this work runs deep. "I had never heard the term 'lived experience,' let alone felt valued for my darkest moments," she said. "CCS changed that. Because of the leadership and mentoring I've received here, I'm passionate about helping others rediscover their value. If I can, you can!"

Her story is one of transformation. She's rebuilt relationships with her children and grandchildren, and finds joy In traveling, gardening, crafting, and exploring the outdoors with her dog Beau.

Wanda's journey from homelessness to leadership is not only inspiring - it's a testament to the life-changing work happening everyday at CCS. With empathy, support, and determination, Wanda shows us what's possible.

Kitchen Crew with a Cause: Stirring Up Good for Years

Since 2019, First National Bank of Gillette has brought warmth and full plates to the Soup Kitchen every third Wednesday of the month. Led by Jennifer Myers, the team cooks up hearty meals like BBQ chicken, meatloaf, and lasagna—often preparing over 70 lbs of chicken and 35 bags of coleslaw to meet demand, and spending \$300-\$500 on average. Jennifer checks in with Soup Kitchen Manager Randi each month to plan ahead, ensuring no one goes hungry. Their dedication not only fills stomachs but also hearts, as they give back to the community while earning volunteer hours through the bank. We're deeply grateful for their support.

Program Improvements

Thanks to a WCDA grant, fiber internet was installed during our major renovation. This upgrade connects the main office and shelter, allowing seamless call transfers. Previously separate lines now function as one system, significantly improving communication, response time, and overall efficiency—especially during crisis situations.

The renovation also added secure entry points and reconfigured office spaces, enhancing privacy and safety for both clients and staff. These improvements create a more confidential environment for discussing sensitive issues, fostering trust and dignity in every interaction.

We welcomed Barbara Jones to our housing team as a case manager. She supports individuals and families in our permanent supportive housing, helping them navigate services, maintain stability, and work toward long-term goals—strengthening our capacity to provide personalized, consistent care.




